Research Supervision

Tan has supervised or co-supervised 18 PhD students across institutions including the National University of Singapore, Nanyang Technological University, Hong Kong Baptist University, the University of Hong Kong, and the University of Michigan. His doctoral students have worked on a wide range of topics, from foreign policy, grassroots governance, and place branding to digital masculinity, decolonial cinema, and the politics of grief and media representation. Several have received prestigious fellowships, including the Hong Kong PhD Fellowship Scheme (HKPFS), and many have gone on to publish, teach, and lead in academia and policy. In recognition of his commitment to postgraduate mentorship, he received the 2024 Performance Award for Research Supervision from HKBU. He has also supervised numerous M.Phil., M.Sc., and professional masters theses (MPP, MPA, MPM) across the fields of political science, public policy, media and communication, and cultural studies.
